Hello, friends!

The passing of Pope Francis has been the cause of both sorrow and reflection. As a Franciscan ministry, this "Jesuit with a Franciscan heart" was special to us. His ecological exhortations such as *Laudato Si* and *Querida Amazonia* were deeply inspiring for our ministry and its mandate to care for Creation. And Pope Francis's recognition of universal human dignity, made explicit in writings like *Fratelli Tutti*, were a guiding light in our call to provide a place of peace and healing for all people here at Saint Kateri's home.

We continue to try to fulfill our mission in opening wide our doors to all members of the community. This Easter we once again hosted an ecumenical sunrise service, which was led by the Reformed Church communities that form the Glen Mohawk Clergy Association. The service drew close to 100 attendees from the local community, and we hope to see many of those faces again as our Summer Season progresses.

We also are excited about welcoming folks who are interested in the Revolutionary War to our site this year. This May marks the 250th anniversary of the first bloodshed in what was then Tryon County, which occurred here on the Shrine grounds. We're working with our friends from County Tourism and County History & Archives to host a day-long event whose highlight is a reenactment of the Liberty Pole raising that led to that conflict.

This event is also the catalyst for some changes in our museum. Throughout the summer, we'll be hosting an exhibit by historical artist Mark Maritato. These paintings, which were commissioned by the National Park Service, depict the events at Valley Forge. We are also installing a new exhibit that interprets land documents in the Shrine's archival collection. "Confederacy, Revolution & Statehood in the Mohawk Valley" talks about the area's inhabitants from the 1600s through the present, also addressing the various roles of Haudenosaunee nations during the Revolutionary War.

Although we are just starting our 2025 Summer Season, our community has continued its year-round work. In March, two of our Advisory Council members led a Lenten reflection with a Franciscan perspective. And many of our volunteers gathered at the end of April for our annual Earth Day-inspired clean-up of the Shrine buildings and grounds, to help prepare for this year's visitors and pilgrims.

As we wait for the election of a new pope, we look forward to celebrating other extraordinary observances in the Catholic Church in 2025. As many of you know, this is a Jubilee year, and the theme is "Pilgrims of Hope." As part of this celebration, the Church is making plenary indulgences available to those who complete certain spiritual practices. In the U.S., that includes visiting a national shrine, such as this one. This year also marks the 800th anniversary of Saint Francis of Assisi's Canticle of the Creatures, as well as the 10th anniversary of Pope Francis's *Laudato Si*.
